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1	PROCEEDING
2	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Good morning,
3	everyone. I'll open the prehearing conference in docket
4	DE 10-096. On April 8, 2010, National Grid filed a
5	proposed tariff to temporarily increase customer
6	contributions to the Company's Storm Fund. The Company
7	seeks to increase funding of the Storm Fund by \$1.98
8	million over a three-year period beginning July 1, 2010,
9	and proposes a Storm Recovery Adjustment Factor of 0.074
10	cents per kilowatt-hour for the period. We issued an
11	order suspending the tariff and scheduling a prehearing
12	conference for today on April 29, 2010.
13	Can we take appearances please.
14	MS. KNOWLTON: Good morning, Chairman
15	Getz and Commissioners Ignatius and Below. My name is
16	Sarah Knowlton, and I'm with the McLane law firm. I'm
17	here today on behalf of Granite State Electric Company,
18	which does business as National Grid. And, with me today
19	from the Company is Kristin Mahnke and David Tufts, who
20	are the Company's two witnesses in this case.
21	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good morning.
22	MR. TUFTS: Good morning.
23	MS. AMIDON: Good morning. My name is
24	Suzanne Amidon. I'm here for Commission Staff. And, with

1	me today is Steve Mullen, who is the Assistant Director		
2	for the Electric Division.		
3	CHAIRMAN GETZ: Good morning. And, I'll		
4	note for the record that the affidavit of publication was		
5	filed on May 6.		
6	So, Ms. Knowlton, opportunity for the		
7	Company to state its position in this proceeding.		
8	MS. KNOWLTON: Thank you. In 2007, as		
9	part of the Merger Settlement Agreement in DG 106 I'm		
10	sorry, 06-107, there was a Storm Fund established, which		
11	allowed the Company to fund that, the Storm Fund, at		
12	\$10,000 per month. The Commission approved that		
13	Settlement Agreement in Order Number 24,777. Pursuant to		
14	the Settlement Agreement, the costs of major storms are		
15	charged against that fund. Any balances in the fund		
16	accrue interest at the customer deposit rate, and, then,		
17	of course, if there is a deficit, then, correspondingly,		
18	the deficit accrues interest to the Company's benefit.		
19	The Merger Settlement Agreement provided		
20	that two years after the effective date of the Granite		
21	State Electric Rate Plan, which was part of the Merger		
22	Settlement Agreement, the Staff and the Company would		
23	evaluate the funding level of the Storm Fund to determine		
24	whether it was adequate. If there was a significant

negative balance, the Settlement Agreement provided that 1 2 the Company was authorized to come before the Commission and seek an increase in the funding level. And, that's 3 4 what this docket is about. 5 The Company has submitted a request for 6 a temporary increase to the funding level over the next 7 three years, because the Storm Fund is in a fairly significant deficit position. The Company is requesting 8 that the Storm Fund over that next three year period be 9 increased to approximately \$1.98 million to eliminate the 10 11 expected deficit, and also to reduce the amount of 12 interest that customers would pay on the deficit. 13 As demonstrated in the testimony of 14 Ms. Mahnke, the increase will have a relatively small bill 15 impact on customers. The Company has submitted its annual Storm Fund Report, and as well as an audit by 16 17 PricewaterhouseCooper of the costs that the Company 18 incurred as part of the December ice storm. The Staff is 19 now auditing all of the storm costs. And, the Company is 20 continuing to work with the Staff so that the audit can be 21 completed. 22 Thank you. CHAIRMAN GETZ: Ms. Amidon. 23 MS. AMIDON: Well, as Attorney Knowlton 24 noted in her statement, Staff Audit is conducting an audit {DE 10-096} [Prehearing conference] {06-01-10}

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1 of the expenses. So, there is no question that the 2 December ice storm in 2008 was a major storm event and 3 that extraordinary costs were incurred by the Company in 4 repairing their infrastructure after the storm. 5 But, after Audit reviews it and confirms 6 whether or not the costs are reasonable, we would go ahead 7 and recommend recovery. At this point, we're just waiting for Audit to conclude its review. And, then, after that, 8 9 we may have a couple of questions, but we expect that the 10 proceeding will be fairly straightforward. 11 CHAIRMAN GETZ: All right. Thank you. 12 Anything from the Bench? 13 (No verbal response) 14 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Hearing nothing, 15 then -- so, I anticipate there will be a technical session 16 and a proposal for a procedural schedule, is that correct? 17 MS. KNOWLTON: Yes. 18 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Then, is there 19 anything else for us to address this morning? 20 MS. KNOWLTON: I have nothing further. 21 CHAIRMAN GETZ: Okay. Hearing nothing 22 else, then we'll close the prehearing conference and await 23 a recommendation from the parties.
