Aquarion Water Company of New Hampshire  
July 11, 2012 — 10:00 A.M.**

On May 14, 2012, Aquarion Water Company of New Hampshire filed a request with the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission to increase its rates. Aquarion states that the higher rates, shown in the table below, are due to, among other things, capital investment, increases in operating expenses, and declining water sales. On a temporary basis, Aquarion has requested an overall increase to its rates of 12.03%. The permanent rates proposed by Aquarion would result in an overall average increase of 18.3% in total. The typical 5/8 inch metered residential customer would see a temporary increase of 12.3% and a permanent rate increase of 18.7% in total. In addition, the Company has requested the Commission to approve its Water Infrastructure and Conservation Adjustment (WICA) pilot program as a permanent program, to authorize a step increase reflecting its 2012 WICA projects in permanent rates, and to permit the deferral and amortization over a 3 year period of the new right-of-way tax imposed by the town of Hampton.





**Reef relief for oysters**  
*Restoration project will help clean up bay*

**STRATHAM** — Efforts to restore oyster levels in the Great Bay have expanded to the Squamscott River.

On Tuesday, crews were working off a barge to construct two acres worth of oyster reef in the river.

While there has been much debate over the past couple of years about what measures need to be taken to improve water quality in the Great Bay estuary, there is no debate about the positive impact of oyster restoration.

"We have to ramp up our restoration efforts," said Daryl Burnett, director of the Na-

ture Conservancy. "There's a lot of controversy out there, but this is something that has no controversy attached to it."

For the past several years, The Nature Conservancy's New Hampshire Chapter and University of New Hampshire have been working to restore the oyster population in the Great Bay by building new oyster reefs in waterways such as the Oyster and Lamprey rivers.

Healthy oyster reefs help to filter nitrogen from the estuary. Any additional oyster reef is viewed as a welcome sight, as high nitrogen levels in the estuary are blamed for killing off eelgrass and impairing the waters of the Great Bay.

Ray Grizzle of the University of New Hampshire said the reefs are constructed by placing tons of recycled steel clam shells in the Squamscott River in a grid pattern. He said oyster spawners need a hard surface on which to settle.

Ray Koniak, director of Marine Sciences for The Nature Conservancy, said the new reefs being built on the

Squamscott River are a great addition to the waterway, although the current environment for oysters is a challenge.

"We get about a quarter of a million oysters on each acre," he said. "It could be a lot better."

Koniak said it's not that the water quality in the Great Bay is bad, it's just that many oysters are killed off within three to five years because of disease. He said that's why it's important to continue with restoration efforts.

"We're building up the system," he said.

With other nitrogen-reducing controls in place, oysters could filter out 10 to 15 percent of the estuary's nitrogen in the coming years, according to Koniak.

The Nature Conservancy estimates that continued oyster restoration and other nitrogen load reductions could bring the estuary's nitrogen load down from 1,225 tons a year to 775 tons by 2020.

"This is a step toward a solution; it's not the final step, but it's a small step," Koniak said.

Much of the controversy surrounding the Great Bay pertains to limiting nitrogen discharges from wastewater treatment plants along the estuary. Currently, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and a handful of Seacoast communities are debating what the limit should be.

Suits target nuclear power

SEABROOK — For the second time in two months, nuclear safety groups have filed federal action against the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, alleging it failed to appropriately fulfill its role as a protector of public health and safety.
