**Aquarion Water Company
Increase in Rates**

On May 19, 2012, Aquarion Water Company (Aquarion) filed a petition with the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (Commission) for temporary rates and for an increase in permanent rates. Aquarion provides water service to approximately 8,770 customers in the towns of Hampton, North Hampton and Rye. Aquarion's request is based on increases in operating expenses as a result of increases in property taxes in the communities Aquarion serves, as well as declining water sales. Aquarion also proposes that the Commission approve its current Water Infrastructure and Conservation Adjustment (WICA) pilot program as a permanent program, approve recovery of the company's 2012 WICA projects in permanent rates, and reset the WICA surcharge to zero beginning in 2013.

The proposed rate request would result in an overall increase in rates of 18.7% for general metered residential customers and an average annual water bill for a single family home of approximately \$515.60, an increase of \$6.76 per month over current rates.

On September 18, 2012 the Commission approved a temporary, or interim, rate representing an increase of approximately 9%, which represents an increase of about \$3.26 to the average single family residential customer's monthly bill. The temporary rate will be reconciled with any permanent rates approved by the Commission.

The Commission will hold a public statement hearing to take comment on the proposed rates at the Hampton Town Office Building at 100 Winnacunnet Road in Hampton on November 28, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.

NORELLI AND CAMPBELL VIE FOR HOUSE SPEAKER

in a landslide in 2010. Some seats remain in question due to recounts.

When New Hampshire Democrats caucus Saturday, they will choose between Rep. Terie Norelli, D-Portsmouth, and Rep. David Campbell, D-Nashua, for House speaker.

Democrats earned the power to choose the next speaker by picking up at least 115 seats on Election Day to win back the House majority from Republicans, who swept into office

Campbell argues the wild electoral swings in recent election cycles show voters punishing the party in power for ideological overreach and failing to work collaboratively with minority members on important issues.

"I believe the past two elections have shown the electorate is definitely not for anybody, they've been against (the party in power)," said Campbell, a Harvard-educated lawyer who served in the House from 1978 to 1982 and again from 2004 to the present. "Two terms ago, the GOP didn't win, voters threw the Democrats out. Now Democrats did not win, voters threw the Republicans out. Voters are dissatisfied with what's going on in Concord, and the only way we can

advance state government is to form a coalition that reaches across party lines. We need to galvanize a coalition to solve problems."

State Rep. Lee Quandt, R-Exeter, who was washed out of office in this election's Democratic wave, agrees with Campbell's assessment.

"One of the reasons we got so many loony tunes in the House the last two years is because the Democrats screwed up so badly the previous four years," Quandt said. "That got the crazies in there and now they have been voted out. I need a neck brace because these wild swings are giving me whiplash."

When Campbell addresses the Democratic caucus, he'll make the pitch that while he and Norelli have very similar voting records that reflect core party values, he is more moderate than Norelli, who served two terms as House speaker from 2006 to 2010. Campbell said he'll be able to work more effectively with minority Republicans.

"Our voting records as far as Democratic values are

identical," Campbell said. "I don't think that's the issue. It's how we're perceived by Republicans and how each of us would lead the House moving forward. I'm a less polarizing person. I think the Republicans respect me and I think they would cooperate with me if I led the House. I'm under no illusions. I understand politics being what they are, many issues split along party lines."

Campbell said he'll abide by whatever Democrats decide on Saturday and will not seek to beat Norelli by joining Republicans with his Democratic supporters.

"This Saturday will determine the next speaker of the House," Campbell said. "If I'm successful, I fully expect Terie Norelli to support me, and if she is successful, I will support her for speaker."

Norelli said her two terms as speaker and her recent experience leading minority Democrats have given her great insights into how she wants to lead going forward.
