I'll also note that we are going to be accepting written comments for another period of time, and Mr. Wiesner has that date, I'm sure, in the front of his mind.

So, I made you go out of order,
Mr. Labrecque. I apologize. Mr. Wiesner, why don't you
do your thing and help us set the scene.

MR. WIESNER: I'll do that. And, I'll note as well that the deadline for written comments is next Friday, the 15th. And, I would encourage people to respect that deadline. You know, this isn't -- this isn't quite as hard and fast a procedural schedule as might be the case in some proceedings, but we do want to move this along. And, in fact, that was the impetus for recommending that the Commission hold this hearing today.

This docket was opened back in the summer at a time when Staff believed there was urgency to try and develop more robust queue management procedures for the net metering program, given that there's a statutory limit on participation in that program. And, substantial progress was made within the first month to develop an outline of what those procedures might look

like. And, our understanding was that the utilities were largely on board with a set of procedures that they would all implement, and that that is reflected in what was attached to the December 3rd Staff memo.

The formal procedures as a draft was circulated back in October, but we received very little, if any, substantive input and response to those procedures. And, then, I think people became interested in other initiatives, including potential legislation that would raise the cap, and there was perhaps not as much focus placed on these queue management processes.

But our understanding is the program continues to be quite successful in the state. Liberty has reached their cap. The Co-op, which is not a part of this process, they had exceeded their cap previously.

And, our understanding is that Eversource believes they may be getting close to their share of the cap as well.

So, these issues are still quite important, in our view, and we had interest in moving the process along. And, so, I guess it's fair to say we recommended that this hearing be held, in order to put parties on the record as to what their positions were with respect to the procedures that had been developed.

And, they're, you know, fairly involved,

in terms of timing and detail, and I think that's what we were looking for. They were developed, in large part, with significant input from the three investor-owned utilities. But this is the first opportunity, I believe, where we will have substantive comment, substantive input from the installer community, as well as other interested stakeholders.

I guess I -- I don't think this is a real concern, but I do want to express it. I'm hopeful that today we can stay focused on these procedures, and not stray into some other areas that might seem relevant, but aren't as focused on the details of utility net metering queue management. For example, you know, the status of the legislation, which is just starting the legislative process in this new session, or what might happen with respect to specific projects which are built at a time when they're sitting on the net metering queue wait list.

So, I would hope that those are issues for another day, that we would not find the need to address today, and stay focused on the procedures as they have been proposed.
