I recently learned that the NH Public Utilities Commission will soon issue an Order concerning PUC Docket DE 22-060 on Changes to the Current Net Metering Tariff Structure. I understand a Settlement Agreement has been filed by several parties in addition to other proposals offered by the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire (CPCNH) and the NH Department of Energy.

I urge the PUC to accept this Settlement Agreement with the proposed modifications by the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire.

Hanover has worked hard over the past 10 years to enable resident to obtain energy independence and reduce the community's reliance on non-renewable energy sources. At the Hanover's Town Meeting on May 9, 2017, the community voted to commit a goal of 100% reliance on renewable sources of electricity by 2030 and renewable sources of fuel for heating and transportation by 2050.
